Task 1: Grant Program Development/Design	 Co-create grant program: Develop with interested community members, representing Overburdened Communities and Vulnerable Population, and WSDOT. Align grant program application, timeline and deliverables to ensure that the resources will support community-centered carbon reduction strategies. Develop grant decision-making process to ensure transparency in allocation of resources.
Task 2: Application and Award	 Decision-making and technical assistance: Provide technical assistance for community members in application process. Grant decisions made and communicated.
Task 2: Partnership	 With WSDOT: Identify what WSDOT partnership would entail. Report out on progress of each grant and the resulting community effort. Collaboratively identify additional partners – internally if WSDOT has expertise and funding, externally if another agency or partner is needed to realize community vision.

Answer – The focus for this grant program will be Overburdened Communities and Vulnerable Populations. Definitions from RCW are below. It will be required to consider barriers to engagement and work to remove them. Language access as well as other barriers to engagement.

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"Overburdened community" means a geographic area where vulnerable populations face combined, multiple environmental harms and health impacts, and includes, but is not limited to, highly impacted communities as defined in RCW <u>19.405.020</u>.

"Vulnerable populations" means population groups that are more likely to be at higher risk for poor health outcomes in response to environmental harms, due to: (i) Adverse socioeconomic factors, such as unemployment, high housing and transportation costs relative to income, limited access to nutritious food and adequate health care, linguistic isolation, and other factors that negatively affect health outcomes and increase vulnerability to the effects of environmental harms; and (ii) sensitivity factors, such as low birth weight and higher rates of hospitalization.

(b) "Vulnerable populations" includes, but is not limited to:

(i) Racial or ethnic minorities;

(ii) Low-income populations;

(iii) Populations disproportionately impacted by environmental harms; and

(iv) Populations of workers experiencing environmental harms."
